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The history of the Testa Di Moro:

The Testa di Moro, also known as the Moor's Head, is a Sicilian legend about a young woman who falls in love with a foreign man during Muslim rule of Sicily in the 12th century: A young Sicilian girl falls in love with a North African man, or moro, who is visiting Palermo.

The two become lovers, but the girl discovers that the man has a wife and family in his home country and plans to return.

In a jealous rage, the girl kills the man in his sleep and cuts off his head. She uses his head as a vase for a basil plant, which symbolizes sacredness and the divine. The basil grows well, thanks in part to the girl's tears.

The girl's neighbors are impressed by the plant and begin making clay vases in the shape of a testa di moro.
